What's inside an astronaut's suitcase?

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
If you were going to spend a year in Space, what would you pack?

Make a space helmet using the materials you can find in your house! You could use tinfoil, cardboard, paper etc.

Instructions on how to make a paper mache planet

Equipment:

- Balloon
- Newspaper
- Glue (if you don't have any glue, mix flour and water together until it looks like pancake batter!)
- Paint
- . Bowl

Top tips!

- Place a blown-up balloon (tied end down) in a small bowl. The bowl will hold your balloon steady as you work.
- After dipping each strip of newspaper into the glue mixture, run it between two of your fingers to remove the excess mixture.

Instructions

- 1. Blow up a balloon
- 2. Create your glue mixture (in a bowl!) If you have glue, mix 1/4 cup of glue and a small amount of water together. If you don't have any glue, mix flour and water together until it's the same consistency as pancake batter.
- 3. Tear your newspaper into small strips, and dip the strips into the glue mixture (so both sides are covered in glue)
- 4. Cover each balloon entirely with wet strips, and you can even add multiple layers (remember, planets are bumpy—they aren't smooth).
- 5. When you have covered the entire balloon with newspaper, let it dry over night.
- 6. After your balloon is dry, you can begin to decorate your balloons. You can use paint, or add bits of cardboard and paper to create the different designs of the planets (rings etc.)
