

COVID-19 Update

England is now under stricter nationwide restrictions until 2nd December, in an attempt to slow down the spread of coronavirus

What you can do.

People will only be allowed to leave their homes for specific reasons under the new measures.

- Childcare or education
- For work if you cannot work from home
- Exercise outdoors or visit an outdoor public place
- Medical reasons, to escape injury or harm
- Shop for food and essentials
- Food shops, supermarkets, garden centres and certain other retailers providing essential goods and services can remain open

What you cannot do.

- No mixing of different households inside homes, except for childcare and other support
- All pubs, bars and restaurants to close takeaways and deliveries are allowed
- All non-essential retail to close
- Avoid all non-essential travel by private or public transport
- Overnight stays and holidays away from your home are not allowed, including holidays in the UK and abroad.
- Children are allowed to move between homes if parents do not live together

Remember - Hands. Face. Space.

hands - wash your hands regularly and for 20 seconds

face – wear a face covering in indoor settings where social distancing may be difficult, and where you will come into contact with people you do not normally meet

space – stay 2 metres apart from people you do not live with where possible, or 1 metre with extra precautions in place (such as wearing face coverings or increasing ventilation indoors)

What does self-isolating mean?

If you have been told to self-isolate, you will need to get to the place where you are going to stay and remain indoors and avoid contact with other people. This will prevent you from spreading the disease to your family, friends and the wider community.

In practical terms, this means that once you reach your home you must:

- stay at home
- not go to work, school or public areas
- not use public transport like buses, trains, trams or taxis
- avoid visitors to your home
- ask friends, family members or delivery services to carry out errands for you such as getting groceries, medications or other shopping
